BACKGROUND OF CZECHS WHO IMMIGRATED TO TEXAS

Who are the Czech people?

- **Originally Czech people came into Western Europe from Central Asia and southern Russia where they lived a monadic life until the 5th century BC. By the 4th century AD Celtic tribes arrived, organized towns, and called the land Cechy (land of the Czechs). The Czechs are of a Slavic people who lived in provinces now called Bohemia, Moravia, and Silesia and are West Slavic people along with the Slovaks, Wends, and Poles.**

Brief history of the Czech lands:

- The Czech people were part of many empires throughout history.
- The last empire was the Austrian-Hungarian Empire, which was divided after World War II. Czechoslovakia was formed in 1918. Large waves of immigration from the Czech lands slowed after the formation of Czechoslovakia. There are many Czech Heritage Day celebrations in October to celebrate when the nation was formed.
- After being liberated from the Nazis after World War II, Czechs experienced democracy for a few years before being taken over by the Soviet communists.
- After many years of Soviet communist control, Czechoslovakia once again became a democratic nation in 1989. This was known as the Velvet Revolution.
- In 1993 the Czechs and Slovaks decided to form their own separate countries and became known as the Czech Republic and the Slovak Republic. This is referred to as the Velvet Divorce in some history books. They are both now members of NATO and the European Union. Even though they are now two countries, each country still celebrates at the end of October the beginning of the independence they had in 1918.

Why did Czechs emigrate from the Austrian Hungarian Empire?

- Escape European Wars
- Escape persecution - political, religious
- Obtain freedom and low-cost land for themselves

Where did Czechs settle in Texas?

- The first 16 families arrived in Galveston in 1852 settling near the Colorado and Brazos rivers in established German settlements in Austin and Fayette counties. Letters from these immigrants to their relatives in the Austrian-Hungarian Empire caused newer waves of immigrants to gravitate to Texas. Many who came then and later were farmers who raised grain and cotton.
